Get Paid for Universal Design – Tax Credit Program Expanded

The Virginia Livable Home Tax Credit (LHTC) program is designed to improve accessibility and universal visitability in Virginia's residential units by providing state tax credits for the purchase of new units or the retrofitting of existing housing units. A recent amendment (awaiting the Governor's signature) will increase the maximum amount of credit allowed from \$2,000 to \$5,000, and expand eligibility to real estate developers in addition to property owners. Stephanie Brown worked with the Fluvanna/Louisa Housing Foundation and volunteers from her church to create an Accessory Dwelling Unit as an addition to her home to serve as an apartment for her daughter, who had sustained permanent injury in an accident. Stephanie went through a challenging process to identify possibilities to maintain her daughter's independence while providing a secure living environment. This was a long and often frustrating process. Stephanie has since become a member of the Disability Services Board and is working on writing up a case study to help others navigate the complex world of housing and services.
